

November 1, Saturday, 8:00 a.m. Yellow Creek, joint outing with the Todd Bird Club led by Meet Margaret Higbee. Meet at the park office located on Route 259 just off Route 422 east of Indiana. One hour and 30 minutes from Pittsburgh. Yellow Creek State Park has been the prime outing location for the Todd Bird Club since the club was created. The park has a large lake that attracts a wide variety of waterfowl and sometimes exciting rarities.

November 16, Sunday, 8:00 a.m. Montour Woods Conservation Area. Meet Sean Brady, Executive Director of the Hollow Oak Land Trust for a bird outing to the Montour Woods Conservation Area. Spend the morning birding and hiking the wooded trails through the conservation area. Explore the stream valley of Meeks Run, one if the cleanest streams in Allegheny County. Trails have uneven surfaces and some hills. Meet at the Conservation area located at 1901 Hassam Road, Moon Township. Directions: From 79 head north on Route 51 into Coraopolis and turn left onto Montour Street, which becomes Montour Street extension. Montour Street Extension ends at Hassam Road. Turn left on to Hassam Road and go about 1/2 mile and look for the parking lot on the right as you go downhill. If you reach the Montour Trail at the bottom, turn around and go back 100 yards.
