From the Nature Observer News Archives, by Chuck Tague. The National Audubon Society 103rd Christmas Bird Count

On December 25, 1900, ornithologist Frank Chapman, an officer of the National Audubon Society, suggested that people spend their holiday counting birds. Up until then, the popular holiday tradition called the Christmas "Side Hunt" resulted in an avian bloodbath. People would choose sides, go out into the woods and kill birds. The team who shot the most birds won the brutal contest. The turn of the century brought about a trend towards conservation. Naturalists became more aware of declines in bird populations. Rather than killing birds, 27 enthusiastic birders joined Frank Chapman in the first annual Christmas Bird Count. 25 Counts from Toronto, Ontario to Pacific Grove, California yielded a total of 90 species and approximately 18,500 individual birds.

The original 27 birders are the inspiration for the more than 50,000 observers who now participate in the National Audubon Society Christmas Bird Counts. Most Counts take place in North America with some extending into Central and South America. The results of these Counts are compiled into more than a century of information recording trends of the winter bird populations across America. Volunteers count all the birds they see or hear in their particular circles in a single day. Each circle is 15 miles in diameter that must not overlap with another. Each Count must take place within 2 weeks of Christmas. The dates of the Official Count period are December 14 through January 5.
